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Regular Session Meeting of the Sandy Springs City Council was held on Tuesday, June 1, 2021 at 6:38 p.m., Mayor Rusty Paul presiding.

I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Rusty Paul called the meeting to order at **6:38 p.m.**

II. ROLL CALL AND GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

City Clerk Raquel D. González called the roll.

Mayor Rusty Paul – present.

Council Members present: Council Member John Paulson, Council Member Steve Soteres, Council Member Chris Burnett, Council Member Jody Reichel, Council Member Tibby DeJulio and Council Member Andy Bauman.

III. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Rusty Paul led the Pledge of Allegiance.

IV. PUBLIC COMMENT

Vera Nazon, 1030 Edgewater Drive, NW – no response.

V. Approval of the Meeting Agenda

Motion and Vote: A motion was made by Council Member Tibby DeJulio, seconded by Council Member Jody Reichel, to approve the meeting agenda. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

VI. Approval of Consent Agenda

Motion and Vote: A motion was made by Council Member Andrew Bauman, seconded by Council Member Chris Burnett, to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

VII. Presentation

VIII. Public Hearing

- A. 2021-164** First Public Hearing on FY2022 Budget and Discussion

Andrea Surratt, City Manager presented the FY2022 proposed budget. The proposed budget for all operating, capital, and special revenue funds totals \$144,624,029. The general fund makes up \$107M. \$1.2M of fund balance was used, reflecting a reduction in the American Rescue Plan, the addition of a Planner position, and \$150K for a recreation grant program. Additionally, at Budget Workshop 3, the City

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Council discussed the use of remaining fund balance beyond the \$1.2M for capital projects. There was approximately \$17.5M between what we will have in the fund balance and what is the required minimum. Specifically, we will end up with a total of \$58M. \$26.5M is the minimum fund balance to meet the City's policy. This leaves \$31M, of which \$14M is being proposed for two types of funds, \$3M for a Fleet fund and \$10M for an Infrastructure Maintenance fund. The City Council has the opportunity to think about additional capital projects with the \$17.5M. Staff will evaluate these items in the proposed Capital Improvement Program, and recommend moving some of those up in time, earlier in the five-year window. The City Council also identified the Old Riverside Master Plan and the Allen Road Park Improvements projects to potentially move up from later years to the FY2022 year in the Capital Improvement Program. Closing out FY2021, the City will know what is left and what the tax digest includes. Staff will ask the Mayor and City Council to consider that in a separate work session, all the discussions about fund balance, later in the year. The 5 Year Capital Improvement Program is the City's first attempt at a five year capital plan. The proposed projects are identified as needs for the City of Sandy Springs. It does not include current, ongoing capital projects. These are additional projects that will be considered. The FY 2022 Budget adoption will only include those projects listed in the FY2022 column of the 5 Year Capital Improvement Program. The rest is a working document.

Mayor Rusty Paul asked Organizational Leadership Development and the Pay and Comp Study Implementation explain why those are capital projects.

City Manager Surratt replied those are large, one-time projects that implemented over more than one fiscal year, so the accounting of that is different than an operating project. Capital projects are not just constructions projects, but can also be master plans. These are HR master plans.

Toni Jo Howard, Finance Director stated when Council puts the money a capital projects account, funds stay in the project account regardless of how many years it takes. At the end of the fiscal year, remaining funds in the general fund automatically roll over to fund balance.

Council Member John Paulson requested when the Staff knows the final 2021 numbers, bring it back in front of Council to see if the funds allow for additional projects in the upcoming year.

City Manager Surratt continued The Fleet Replacement Fund and the Infrastructure Maintenance Fund were created using fund balance. The Fleet Replacement Fund, for administrative and public safety vehicles, \$3M would serve as seed money. The City will need to determine an amount that is appropriate to contribute annually to the fund. The Infrastructure Maintenance Fund is to ensure the City plans for the ongoing maintenance of its facilities. FY2022 includes \$7M in facilities, paving, guardrails, bridge and dam, and stormwater. Staff recommends \$10M to create the fund. The City will need to determine an appropriate amount to contribute annually.

There were no public comments.

Council Member Tibby DeJulio stated Staff is not recommending how much should be saved each year for the two funds. This is essentially increasing the reserves.

City Manager Surratt replied yes. The Fleet Replacement Fund, includes a FY2022 \$1.1M recommendation in operational and capital budgets for the replacement of various types of fleet: \$750K is for police vehicles, there will be the purchase of six electric vehicles to add to the fleet pool, and a few other assorted trucks. That is a typical year.

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Council Member Chris Burnett asked if in FY2022 it will cost \$6.6M to operate the Performing Arts Center, Performing Arts Center revenues will cover \$5M, but the general fund will cover the \$1.6M shortfall. The goal is ultimately the goal to get the Performing Arts Center self-funded, but to get the general fund contribution to less than \$2M is a great accomplishment.

City Manager Surratt replied correct, but the general fund contribution has been reduced to \$1.3M. With a great Performing Arts Center Director, there is a great season lined up.

Applicant is ATGA Associates LLC; Robert Michael Belmonte for Consumption on the Premises of Wine, Malt Beverages, and Distilled Spirits.

Toni Jo Howard, Finance Director presented ABL 76821, an Alcoholic Beverage License for Consumption on the Premises of Wine, Malt Beverages, and Distilled Spirits for ATGA Associates, LLC, DBA Hilton Atlanta Perimeter Suites. The business is located at 6120 Peachtree Dunwoody Road NE, in District 3. Applicant ATGA Associate, LLC, Robert Michael Belmonte, has met all of requirements. Staff recommends approval.

There were no public comments.

Motion and Vote: Council Member Chris Burnett made a motion to approve agenda item 2021-165 for the approval of the Alcoholic Beverage License Application for Consumption on the Premises of Wine, Malt Beverages, and Distilled Spirits for ATGA Associates, LLC, DBA Hilton Atlanta Perimeter Suites, 6120 Peachtree Dunwoody Road NE. Council Member Jody Reichel seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

IX. New Business

- A. 2021-166** Request For Mayor And City Council Consideration of an Ordinance Appointing the Fulton County Department of Registration and Elections to Conduct the City of Sandy Springs General Municipal Election on November 2, 2021 and Runoff Election on November 30, 2021; Authorizing an Intergovernmental Agreement Between the City and the County Relating Thereto; and Authorizing the Mayor to Execute the Intergovernmental Agreement

Raquel Gonzalez, City Clerk stated the City of Sandy Springs partners with the Fulton County Department of Registration and Elections to conduct the City's general and runoff elections. Under an IGA, Fulton County provides the necessary staff, equipment, and supplies to host advance voting and Election Day voting for the City's elections. The City is required to qualify its municipal candidates, provide timely notice of any referendum questions, and publish all legal ads related to call for elections and qualifying information. The fee for the 2021 Sandy Springs general election is a flat-fee of \$2.96 per eligible, registered voter, estimated at \$226,076. If one is necessary, the fee for a runoff election is flat -fee of \$2.46 per registered, eligible voter, or \$187,887. Staff recommends approval of the presented ordinance appointing the Fulton County Department of Registration and Elections to Conduct the City of Sandy Springs General Municipal Election on November 2, 2021 and Runoff Election on November 30, 2021, and authorization of the related intergovernmental agreement between the City and County.

Motion and second: A motion was made by Council Member Jody Reichel, seconded by Council Member Tibby DeJulio, to approve agenda item 2021-166, the Ordinance Appointing the Fulton County Department

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of Registration and Elections to Conduct the City of Sandy Springs General Municipal Election on November 2, 2021 and Runoff Election on November 30, 2021; Authorizing an Intergovernmental Agreement Between the City and the County Relating Thereto; and Authorizing the Mayor to Execute the Intergovernmental Agreement.

Council Member Jody Reichel asked when is the last time the City had a run off election.

Mayor Rusty Paul replied there were three run offs in the City's first election.

Council Member Chris Burnett asked is the fee prorated based on the number of eligible voters for the district that has a run off.

City Clerk Gonzalez replied yes. The fee is based on voters eligible to vote in the runoff only. You do not have to vote in the general election to participate in its runoff.

Vote on the motion: The motion carried by unanimous vote.

- B. 2021-167** Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of an Amendment to Chapter 6, Alcoholic Beverages, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Sandy Springs, Georgia to Permit Tasting of Distilled Spirits

Dan Lee, City Attorney presented an ordinance amending Chapter 6, Alcoholic Beverages, of the City's Code of Ordinances, to provide for a Distilled Spirits Tastings permit, as presented at the June 1, 2021 City Council Work Session.

Motion and second: A motion was made by Council Member Jody Reichel, seconded by Council Member Steve Soteres, to approve agenda item 2021-167, an Amendment to Chapter 6, Alcoholic Beverages, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Sandy Springs, Georgia to Permit Tasting of Distilled Spirits.

Council Member Jody Reichel asked does the customer have to finish the bottle or purchase it?

City Attorney Lee replied only the establishment decides what is tasted, not the patron. Only bottles delivered by the manufacturer or distributor can be used in the portion. Unfinished portions must be left.

Vote on the motion: The motion carried by unanimous vote.

- C. 2021-168** Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of a Resolution Adopting an Updated Alcoholic Beverage License Fees Schedule

Dan Lee, City Attorney presented an updated alcoholic beverage license fee schedule that includes the proposed fee for the distilled spirits tasting license. The \$75 fee is the same as the Wine and Malt Beverages Tasting permit. The fee is paid annually.

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Motion and vote: A motion was made by Council Member Jody Reichel, seconded by Council Member Steve Soteres, to approve agenda item 2021-168, the Resolution Adopting an Updated Alcoholic Beverage License Fees Schedule. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

- D. 2021-169** Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of an Amendment to Chapter 6, Alcoholic Beverages, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Sandy Springs, Georgia, to Remove the Requirement for a Certificate from a Registered Surveyor for an Application Submitted within 12 Months of the Prior License

Dan Lee, City Attorney stated under the current ordinance, the applicant for an alcohol license is required to have a surveyor certify the establishment is more than 1,000 feet from a school or church, even though it may have been certified within 12 months prior to that application. The amendment will relieve an applicant from that requirement if the applicant if the establishment had a prior, valid license issued within 12 months of the new application. This includes renewals and new licenses.

Motion and vote: A motion was made by Council Member Jody Reichel, seconded by Council Member John Paulson, to approve agenda item 2021-169, an Amendment to Chapter 6, Alcoholic Beverages, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Sandy Springs, Georgia, to Remove the Requirement for a Certificate from a Registered Surveyor for an Application Submitted within 12 Months of the Prior License. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

- E. 2021-170** Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of the Settlement and Purchase of Right-of-Way and Easements Related to a Portion of Land Located in Land Lot 27 in the 17th District Fulton County, Georgia, Parcel No: 17-0024-11085-8 for the TS-105 Grogans Ferry at Roswell Road Project

Dan Lee, City Attorney stated Staff tried diligently to purchase the property. The independent appraisal for the fee simple part, the permanent easement and the construction easement came to \$31,900. The property owner wanted \$150,000. In March, the City Council authorized the use of eminent domain. The appraisal was seven months old at the time of filing. The law requires the independent appraisal be as close to the time of filing as possible to reflect the value at the time of taking. The appraisal was probably low just because of the timing of it. In addition, because of the property change the property owner is losing a curb cut. Removing the curb cut away from the intersection interrupts an easement the property owner has with the adjoining property. The property owner had to buy another easement to replace the one they had. There was also the removal of signs. Due to a timing issue with Georgia Power, the City needs to buy another year on the temporary easement. Because of the age of the original appraisal, the cost to relocate a sign and the adjoining easement, and an extension to the construction easement limits, it is recommended the City Council settle this matter in the increased amount of \$75,136.

Motion and vote: A motion was made by Council Member Steve Soteres, seconded by Council Member John Paulson, to approve agenda item 2021-170, the Settlement and Purchase of Right-of-Way and Easements Related to a Portion of Land Located in Land Lot 27 in the 17th District Fulton County, Georgia, Parcel No: 17-0024-11-085-8 for the TS-105 Grogans Ferry at Roswell Road Project. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

- F. **2021-171** Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of Acceptance of an Agreement to Purchase Temporary Construction Easement on Property That Lies within Land Lot 32 of the 17th District of Fulton County, Georgia. (605 Dalrymple Road; Tax ID# 17-0032- LL-015-5)

Marty Martin, Public Work Director stated the temporary construction easement is in support of project TS-108 Dalrymple Road at Roswell Road Intersection Project. The acquisition of the 563.54 square feet to begin a taper of the curb line of an additional turning lane at Dalrymple and Roswell Road. Staff was able to negotiate an amicable settlement of \$4,500.00 with the property owners.

Motion and vote: A motion was made by Council Member Chris Burnett, seconded by Council Member Steve Soteres, to approve agenda item 2021-171, the acceptance of an Agreement to Purchase Temporary Construction Easement on Property That Lies within Land Lot 32 of the 17th District of Fulton County, Georgia. (605 Dalrymple Road; Tax ID# 17-0032- LL-015-5). The motion carried by unanimous vote.

- G. **2021-172** Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of a Resolution to Approve a Contract Award with SD & C, Inc., to Construct 4721 Dudley Lane Sidewalk Repair Project, T6016-2, and to Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Contract

Marty Martin, Public Works Director stated during the original construction, the property owner at 4721 Dudley Lane expressed concerns with the impacts of the project. At the time, the construction project settled on an interim solution that provided passable sidewalk, though not a desirable finish to the property owner. The City began to explore alternative designs to address those concerns. There was also existing damage to the asphalt along the frontage that contributed to poor drainage in the finished condition. The asphalt along the frontage will be repaired by a separate contractor/contract after the new curb and gutter is installed. The current project is to replace the two existing driveway aprons, curb and gutter, and sidewalk and add retaining walls to address the elevation differences at 4271 Dudley Lane. The City received four bids in response to a request for construction bids. SD & C Inc., a current contractor on another TSPLOST project, is the low bidder at \$109,358.25. The engineer's construction cost estimate for the Project is \$85,510. Upon administrative review of the bids, staff recommends that award be made to the low bidder, SD & C, Inc., in the amount of \$109,358.25. At the next City Council meeting Staff will present the easement agreements, which have already been secured with the property owner.

Motion and second: A motion was made by Council Member Andrew Bauman, seconded by Council Member Tibby DeJulio, to adopt agenda 2021-172, the Resolution to Approve a Contract Award with SD & C, Inc., to Construct 4721 Dudley Lane Sidewalk Repair Project, T6016-2, and to Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Contract.

Council Member Andy Bauman stated that is a high cost for construction of about 150 feet. Was there any design flaw with the original contract? Did the homeowner donate right-of-way? Is this a safety or aesthetic issue?

Public Works Director Martin stated that has to do with the complexity of the project. This is a loop driveway, and there is a good bit of concrete and slope work. The slope work was not well reconciled with the driveway and with the interim solution Staff tried to leave not too much difference from the original condition of the driveway. Deterioration of the roadway that contributed to a drainage problem in area was

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293 also identified. There is also retaining wall to further adjust the slope, that was not part of the original
294 design, at the request of the property so as to not take it all out at grading easement. The original design
295 was right on, but the reaction of the property as it was original designed was not something they could live
296 with. We are trying to be responsive to that. Very little right-of-way was required, only drive way and
297 construction easement. There is some drop offs on the edge of the driveway, and there is some concern with
298 people trying to operate in and out of the driveway. In the interests of other drivers accessing the driveways,
299 there is a hazardous and potential property damage.

300
301 **Council Member Bauman** stated Dudley is notorious for having craters in the road. Staff has characterized
302 this as some things that the homeowners want. What is the City's interests?
303

304 **Public Works Director Martin** stated this solution will achieve a safer sidewalk and will create a situation
305 where there is less likely to be property damage because of the driveway solution, in a way that will property
306 some of the property owner's interests. Although Staff believed the original design was correct, it was not
307 executed after concerns were raised by the property owner. It is the same amount of concrete work, so there
308 would be no savings between the original design and the current staff recommendation.
309

310 **Wesley Waters, CIP Unit Manager** stated there is concern over the existing mature trees and landscaping
311 that are adjacent to the retaining walls are paramount in the easement agreement that will come before
312 Council next week, at \$15,000.
313

314 **Public Works Director Martin** stated this is consistent with all the property owners that donated right-of-
315 way. The City cannot dictate that they replace the tree canopy.
316

317 **Council Member Bauman** stated the difference is that the City does have an interest in mature tree canopy,
318 and if there was an opportunity to replace the trees it is in the City's interests, rather than pay for their
319 destruction.
320

321 **Public Works Director Martin** stated the driveways are inferior to the City's standard. They allow
322 drainage on the roadway from the property. The City typically requires an ADA driveway rise at the
323 roadway to prevent stormwater intrusion.
324

325 **Council Member John Paulson** stated so the contractor built an inferior driveway to get the project done.
326 So we are paying to correct that. This solution will build some retaining wall that will impact trees.
327

328 **Public Works Director Martin** stated that and tying apron into a proper rate.
329

330 **Dan Lee, City Attorney** stated this project has been reviewed for quite some time by Legal and Public
331 Works Departments. Once policy problem we have, the cost to cure some of these items, like trees and
332 sometimes signs, the City was in contract for the cure, but then the property owner would not like it. So
333 this method of working with the property owner to determine cure, frees the City from that debate. There
334 is a question of whether or not there was a design flaw because the elevations from the original contractor
335 does not match. You have a fiddle problem and an overzealous property owner.
336

337 **Council Member Bauman** stated as a matter of policy, those trees have a community value. The big ticket
338 item is what is the City's interest?
339

340 **Amended motion and vote:** Council Member Andrew Bauman withdrew the original motion and the
341 amended motion, seconded by Council Member Tibby DeJulio, to defer agenda 2021-172, the Resolution

to Approve a Contract Award with SD & C, Inc., to Construct 4721 Dudley Lane Sidewalk Repair Project, T6016-2, and to Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Contract, to the June 15, 2021 City Council Meeting. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

H. 2021-173 Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of a Resolution to Approve a Contract Award to Blount Construction Company, Inc. for the FY 2021 Deep Mill Asphalt Repair, and to Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Contract

Marty Martin, Public Works Director presented the list of roadways requiring deep mill asphalt repair, prepared by Staff that was put out for bid. The staff estimate for the work was \$1M. Bid responses were received in March, 2020. Although there is an extensive amount of deep mill repair required for River Valley Road, Staff received favorable responses. Staff recommends contract award in the amount of \$749,259.57 be made to Blount as the lowest, responsive and responsible bidder to perform the work.

Motion and second: A motion was made by Council Member John Paulson, seconded by Council Member Chris Burnett, to approve agenda item 2021-173, approval of Contract Award to Blount Construction Company, Inc. for the FY 2021 Deep Mill Asphalt Repair, and to Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Contract.

Council Member John Paulson asked if the contractor for the deep mill repair work and the annual repaving program contractor will ever work in the same areas.

Public Works Director Martin replied no because the roadways on the deep mill repair list on roadways segments not subject to the asphalt repaving projects.

Vote on the motion: The motion carried by unanimous vote.

I. 2021-141 Request for Mayor and City Council Consideration of a Resolution to Approve a Contract with CMES Incorporated to Construct Brandon Mill Road Sidewalk Project, TS167, and Authorization for the City Manager to Execute the Contract

Marty Martin, Public Works Director stated this will resume the work stalled on the Brandon Mill Sidewalk project. Approval will allow the City to move quickly when it is time to move the project forward, after legal hurdles are addressed at the appropriate time.

Dan Lee, City Attorney stated the original contractor has filed bankruptcy. The City cannot remove the contractor without the bankruptcy court's approval. The City prepared the motion requesting relief from the stay and the court required mediation. The City has reached an agreement with the contractor, which will be brought to the court. Though, the contractor has not reached an agreement with the surety. The presented resolution is contingent upon the stay of bankruptcy being lifted.

Public Works Director Martin stated after the contract is executed, the contractor will mobilize within 10 days of the notice to proceed. There is a lot of retaining wall associated with project, plus all the driveway tie-ins, leading to the \$1.5M contract cost. Once this stretch of the project is completed, there is one more segment connecting this piece to the Abernathy Greenway. CMES Incorporated just completed the Spalding, Dalrymple Trowbridge Intersection Projector. They did a good job on good schedule. They have demonstrated great confidence.

392 **Council Member Chris Burnett** asked is there a way to pre-negotiate with the surety to avoid some of the
393 challenges the City had with previous contractor. Or perhaps requiring the contractor to post a letter of
394 credit.
395

396 **City Attorney Lee** stated the balance of that is possibly limiting the number of bidders, keeping some folks
397 out that need a chance in. Staff is trying to find a balance to protect the City's interest. The failures of this
398 contractor are related to their poor financial status.
399

400 **Motion and vote:** A motion was made by Council Member Chris Burnett, seconded by Council Member
401 Jody Reichel, to approve agenda item 2021-141, the Resolution to Approve a Contract with CMES
402 Incorporated to Construct Brandon Mill Road Sidewalk Project, TS167, and Authorization for the City
403 Manager to Execute the Contract. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

409 **A. 2021-174 Mayor and Council Report**
410

411 **Mayor Rusty Paul** reported the Diversity and Inclusion Task Force has raised two recommendations for
412 staff to review – adding a translation feature to the City's website and adding a multi-language subtitling
413 feature to the City's live-streamed public meetings. The Task Force will meet with staff to learn what are
414 the things that the City is already doing. Also, the Task Force has been asked to provide a comprehensive
415 report when ready with all of the recommendations.
416

417 **Deputy Chief Craig Chandler** reported that four Sandy Springs Police Department officers responded to
418 a DUI crash where the car was on fire. Two officers used a fire extinguisher to put out the fire and two
419 other officers pulled the driver from the vehicle.
420

421 **Mayor Paul** stated the City of Sandy Springs has the best group of first responders. The Police Department
422 is also dealing with a lot of party houses. Finally the City Springs Splash Pad is open for the community.
423 The City Hall Lobby is also open to the public. The performing arts center season has been announced. It
424 is a wide and diverse list of performances. Tickets go on sale on June 5, but those with memberships can
425 purchase now.
426

427 **Council Member John Paulson** reported on Saturday there were 500 – 600 people in the performing arts
428 center for a ballerina program.
429

430 **Council Member Andy Bauman** reported the Saturday Farmers Market was full of patrons.

434 **Andrea Surratt, City Manager** announced the press release has been issued for the City's 2021 July
435 Fourth fireworks program.

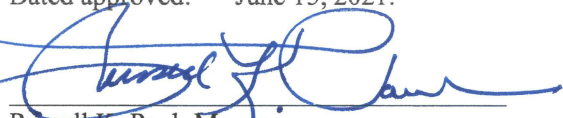

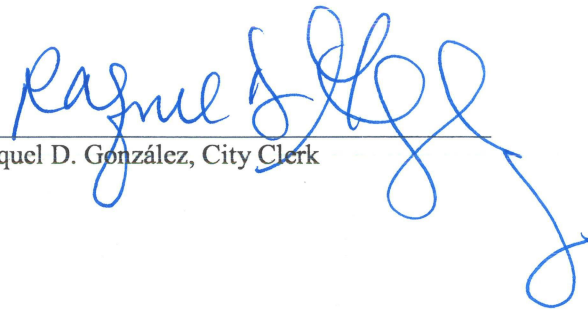
